# **Adaptive Learning** tool CogBooks launched in the School of Geosciences

In January Information Services and the School of Geosciences launched the Adaptive Learning tool CogBooks for the course Global Tectonics and the Rock Cycle (GTRC).

Part one of the pilot will run for five weeks. Part two, Introduction to Geophysics, commences in February. This tool focuses on supporting students to master course materials through tailoring their learning path according to their individual responses to the materials.

Geophysics students will access the course material in CogBooks before the lecture, getting a flavour of a flipped classroom approach. GTRC decided that the students would access CogBooks after the lecture. Students gain access via their course in Learn.

A survey has been distributed to get student feedback about CogBooks to decide whether should be developed as a service.

The recent NMC Horizon Report offers a comprehensive five year overview of the future of technology. Predicted long term trends highlighted the need for increased cross-institution collaboration to drive technology adoption. Medium-term trends include measuring learning via learning analytics and the proliferation of open educational resources (OER). Immediate innovation included digital making, creating and coding for all students and the redesign of learning spaces.

Edinburgh is home to various projects aligned with the NMC vision. Some of those projects and initiatives have provided updates below.

We continue to support the delivery of a growing number of massive online open courses (MOOCs) and are supporting colleagues to publish open educational resources (OER) via Open.Ed. The Student-Led Individually Created Courses (SLICCs) pilot is supported by LTW eLearning tools and learning analytics are enhancing the University's virtual learning environments (VLEs).

Learning spaces are actively being redesigned as part of the University's larger estates program and to enhance the physical educational experience. The University's media engagement systems will be refreshed to include new tools for creating, managing and sharing media. We are exploring wearable technology for enhanced teaching and learning with the 15 student teams in our Google Glass project.

The University of Edinburgh's membership of NMC will provide access to leading professional development projects specifically designed to support our community of innovative teaching and learning practitioners.



## Google Glasses in Edinburgh Classes

The LTW Glass Project project team will be working with the student teams over the coming months to turn their ideas into viable pilot projects to explore the opportunities for using smart glass technology in and around campus. The team held a number of hands on sessions for students and staff to try out Google Glass. These sessions were very popular, fun and interactive. Students were asked to put forward ideas for how wearable tech like Glass might support learning, teaching and life around campus. Proposals were received from students in all Colleges and some excellent and exciting ideas were put forward. ## Learning design support at scale

A six-month project is underway to investigate processes, resources and tools to deliver an inclusive learning design service. The Educational Design and Engagement team through Fiona Hale are championing the initiative.

Learning Design enables academic course and programme teams to benefit from the input of a wider range of experience and skills when designing or reviewing courses, ensuring that learning technology; Library, Careers and student views are included. The work aligns well with the University need to provide ever-improved quality and consistency of student experience, through initiatives such as Programme and Course Information Management (PCIM) and the Enhanced Course Descriptor. Similarly it provides opportunity to build towards the 2020 vision for learning and teaching. The work provides an opportunity to clarify the capacity requirements both for IS and key University partners in order to develop and deliver learning design support at scale for online.



Information Services are now taking advantage of the power of SharePoint in Office 365 to update these sites to provide an improved service for committee members and administrators as well as significantly improving the search and discovery options for all.

The new service will provide simpler to manage security and easy-to-use options for new features such as integrated calendars, collaborative working on documents, task lists, and version control. The Digital Curation Centre (DCC) will be part of the EUDAT 2020 project which launches this spring and will involve further development of our internationally acclaimed tool to assist researchers to write Data Management Plans, DMPonline. EUDAT is supported by the European Commission to deliver data infrastructure that supports researchers in managing and sharing their data. As part of the project, DCC will further customise DMPonline for Data Management Planning, integrating it with the EUDAT suite of services to provide a seamless data management environment and workflow.

We'll also be providing online and face-to-face training to help researchers meet the requirements of the European Commission's open data pilot.


**KB Centre level 2** closes for refurbishment on 22 May and re-opens for the start of the new session.

## Supporting library skills for student success

The Library Academic Support team in IS User Services Division delivers bespoke information literacy training to Schools across the University. Teaching in a variety of settings including library tours, lectures and hands on workshops, the team aims to help students develop the skills that will enable them to be successful learners and researchers.

Academic Support Librarians also support and advise on the management and purchasing of print and digital resources in their subject areas, and their teaching is informed and enriched by these collections. That means their information literacy training can be anything from showing students theological books from the fifteenth century to helping students develop a strategy for a

systematic literature review of the latest medical research. The diversity of their approaches – large scale lectures, small group workshops, online screencasts – is matched by the diversity of subject areas that the Academic Support team engages with. The team also works with IS Skills to deliver a programme of seminar sessions open to all subject areas.

## ECA Rare Books Collection Bookplate

A beautiful 'Ex Libris ECA' bookplate, created by Jonathan Gibbs, will be proudly displayed in each item in the Edinburgh College of Art Rare Books Collection.

In August 2011 Edinburgh College of Art (ECA) merged with the University of Edinburgh, and the Centre for Research Collections became the new home for the ECA Rare Books Collection. The rare books now enjoy a state of the art climate controlled and safe environment. The collection has been fully catalogued and some items have already been used in exhibitions within the library and in digital displays.

Jonathan Gibbs, a professional artist and illustrator, and Programme Director of Illustration at ECA, was asked to design a bookplate that would reflect the activities of ECA and that would embody the spirit of ECA.

## Rare books and major Scottish acquisitions

Edinburgh University Library has been collecting modern literature ever since William Drummond gave us his library of contemporary poetry and drama in 1626 – at a time when many leading libraries were not accepting such material. Special Collections continues to build on these strengths, particularly in the area of modern Scottish poetry.

In recent months we have acquired an exceptional range of collections. First, we were given a collection of some 1,000 pamphlets from the library of songwriter and activist Hamish Henderson, whose papers we already hold. We were also given an amazing collection of poetry, including many rare, annotated and signed copies, from the library of Tessa Ransford. Tessa was the founder of the Scottish Poetry Library and a major poet herself. Finally, we have purchased at auction a unique collection of manuscripts including work by Hugh MacDiarmid, Compton Mackenzie and Robert Garioch. This archive is directly connected to the University through The Jabberwock magazine – whose editor Ian Holroyd apparently retained all these items. The Jabberwock was in the 1950s an important vehicle for what was then new Scottish writing. This purchase was possible with support from the College of Humanities and Social Sciences and the Friends of the National Libraries.

Modern Scottish literature is a key teaching and research area at the University and these collections will be directly relevant to students and academic staff.

## **CMVM** Information Strategy

The College of Medicine and Veterinary Medicine Information Strategy 2015-2018 was agreed and published in November 2014.

Aligned to the strategy, some exciting developments which are already underway include:

- Delivery of a high resolution, 3D interactive virtual walkthrough app of the world-famous Anatomy Museum for public engagement and future learning and teaching purposes.
- Exploring the use of innovative technology such as LiFi, which
  utilises the visible light spectrum instead of radio frequencies to
  enable wireless data communication, providing a number
  of significant benefits over WiFi.
- The migration of all College staff to Office 365 for email and diary services.
- Proposals for the College to adopt the IS supported cloud printing service across the estate.
- Developing a roadmap for Information Governance standards, including the storage of sensitive data.
- Working with the NHS to develop a joint IT strategy, including the proposed rollout of eduroam across the NHS Lothian WiFi estate.

While not exhaustive, this provides an insight into some of the exciting changes happening within the College of Medicine and Veterinary Medicine aligned to some key IS and University strategies.

A successful project which formed part of the wider main library refurbishment and decant process finally came into fruition in November 2014. The Architecture, Desktop and Software Services teams moved from the basement of 4 Buccleuch Place to a newly designed and refurbished open plan office space at JCMB, Kings Buildings.

The project addressed various requests which included larger desks to accommodate the use of multiple monitors, workspaces with enhanced privacy for managers and small meeting pods. This move has brought all IT Infrastructure colleagues together into one central location, which has been of particular benefit to the Architecture team and members of the UniX Central Systems team.

The project has been a huge success and staff have embraced and welcomed their new working environment.

## IT Systems – what's new for Information Services Group

IS Applications run a rolling three year planning process to identify and prioritise the IT systems development needs of the University community. Strategic projects are currently underway to improve the IT systems and services delivered by ISG, including:

Improvements to MyEd and its mobile interface are in progress. Following the release of the **MyEd Mobile platform** in 2014, IS have been engaging with students to obtain their feedback. Based on this feedback, a follow-on project to enhance the MyEd mobile interface will start in March, aiming to complete for the start of the new academic year.

Following the upgrade to the University's **Management Information Reporting Service**, a project to deliver new features of the service is underway. A new reporting tool, BI Crystal Reports, will be available allowing business areas to offer standard reports. A BI Dashboard tool will also be released, which will show key

strategic and operational information. This will enable the University to improve decision making based on more accurate data reporting.

A project was recently completed which has improved the underlying infrastructure for corporate applications. Several business applications have been migrated to new **Virtual infrastructure** which offers improved performance as well as the ability to easily extend the specification of server hosts. The migration of applications to the new infrastructure have been planned throughout 2015.

## **CESAR** transforms OLL processes

The Office of Lifelong Learning (OLL) launched a new Continuing Education System for Administration and Registration (CESAR) in January 2015.

OLL offers a range of courses for University staff, students and the wider community. The system used for OLL administration, 'OLLIE', has become increasingly costly to maintain and OLL have had to rely on multiple manual processes outside the system: OLLIE no longer effectively supports the student experience expected from a world-class University.

CESAR was developed by IS Application Division in partnership with OLL to address these problems. It has been developed using an 'agile' approach with highly skilled software development staff working alongside business experts from OLL to:

- define the desired end to end business and student processes and remove redundant business processes;
- develop a new bespoke system which meets the needs of OLL and its students;
- improve the student experience by automating data capture where possible and provide a high quality user interface;
- migrate relevant data from OLLIE to CESAR.

Particular thanks go to Bob Carr, Jemma Wallace, Craig Middlemass, Sabrina Niziolek, John Allison, Thalia Nikolaidou, Chris Konczak, Peter Jackson and Dave Berry for their hard work throughout this successful project.

## Library Labs online

A Library Labs website has been launched to showcase the experimental and innovative work undertaken by staff within Library and University Collections. The site will be used as an incubation area for projects related to library, archives and museum collections and services.

Our first project looks at gamification in the form of Metadata Games, where users tag digitised items from the collections by saying what they see on screen. This enables additional search data to be crowd sourced for images taken by the Library's Digital Imaging Unit.

The Tag It metadata game was part of Innovative Learning Week, when 3,352 tags were created for 472 images of the University's Art Collection. This additional data will be used to improve the discoverability of our collections online.



## New Library Management Platform and Discovery service

The Library is in the process of implementing a new Library Management Platform (LMP). This is possibly the most significant project a Library can undertake. To give you an idea of just how momentous the current project is, the last time the Library Management Platform at the University Library was replaced was in 1999, 16 years ago!

The Library Management Platform underpins all the back office functions of the Library such as acquisitions, cataloguing and circulation and provides Library users with access to search collections via the Library Catalogue.

#### Time for change

The current LMP, Voyager, was designed to deal primarily with print-collections, such as books and print journals. With 86% of the library materials budget now spent on online resources, Voyager no longer provides the necessary functionality to manage the breadth and format of the collections acquired by the University Library. We also know from feedback that students and staff can find it confusing to search multiple systems to find the resources needed for study and research.

#### Selecting a new platform

Throughout 2014, teams in the Library, Procurement and IS Applications Divisions worked with academic staff and students to develop requirements, engage with suppliers and evaluate subsequent bids. Following a rigorous tendering process, in December Library systems vendor Ex Libris was awarded the contract to provide the new Library Management Platform.

A range of research libraries, including University College London, University of Manchester and University of York already use the same Ex Libris platform.

#### Alma and Primo

There are two elements to the new platform, 'Alma', which is the back office system and 'Primo', which will provide the new Discovery Service and replace the current Library Catalogue.

In February, we had a fantastic response to the competition to name the new Discovery service, which will be called DiscoverEd.

#### DiscoverEd launches this summer

As the summer 'go live' date approaches, teams across nine Library-related functional areas will work together to configure the new platform, migrate data and ensure integration with existing systems.

IS Applications is providing a leading role on the project management and governance, as well as technical expertise for the integrations with core University systems such as the Identity Management system and eFinancials.

The Library will also be working with two user groups focusing on Discovery. Academic staff and students are represented on the groups and will be providing us with valuable feedback to help us to configure DiscoverEd to meet your study and research needs.

#### Communication

We'll be communicating regularly with Library users to keep you up to date with developments. # **60 seconds with:** Gavin McLachlan

Chief Information Officer and Librarian to the University

### **Quick questions**

#### **Favourite lunch spot?**

I don't know that many yet, but I always think that Pret a Manger is consistently overpriced, but good, food!

#### Who do you look up to?

Researchers – it's a very difficult profession, especially in some areas where they know the chance they will make a big discovery is small, but they still commit their lives to contributing knowledge.

#### Do you have any favourite sports?

I'd probably say the National Hockey League (NHL), and I always find the Winter Olympics fascinating..

#### Mars Bars - plain or deep-fried?

I'd have to go for plain!

#### Could you tell us a bit more about your professional background to date?

Most of my background is in the commercial world: I worked in the sports apparel industry and then moved over to the collision repair industry. I moved on to the education provider industry here in the UK, where I learned a lot about the university sector and about university administration. And then I moved on to UCL and worked there for almost six years.

#### Where do you see our IS services in five years' time?

We need to adapt ourselves to changes in the environment and the changes in the technology. It's about evolving ourselves and looking at how we can use IT to transform the University.

There are said to be three eras of IT: the first was when IT technology was first used to help assist people, so you could replace or automate an individual process (like word processing) with a piece of software. The second era was when IT was used to underpin and automate whole areas of business processes within an institution and the information collected became an asset in its own right – the information age – where the idea of IT as a service was born. And now we're entering the third era, where technology has reached such a level capability that it can transform the way an entire institution operates, even creating new business models. And it's this transformative nature of technology and information which is really going to be a hallmark of what I want to try and accomplish in IS. It's about completely changing the way whole things operate: ten or twenty years ago, for example, it wasn't possible to give a full online student experience, but now it is – because the technology exists. And it wasn't possible to do most research in a computational fashion, but now it is – the whole game changes. And that's what we need to look at: we need to advise the University about how to use technology and information to transform the way it operates.

#### What challenges do you expect in this role?

I think some of the challenges are around 'IT debt' – we've under-invested in areas like infrastructure, IT security, architecture – areas that aren't immediately apparent. Take architecture, for example: at first glance it doesn't appear to be a big problem, but it is – it's like having the foundation of your house being built on quicksand and you don't realise until you try to add another floor to your house and it starts sinking.

Also anything involving cultural change is difficult. A big challenge is to win the trust of the Colleges and the Schools, so we can work in a collaborative way. And then there's funding, which is always a challenge: IS services are quite expensive!

#### What do you like to do outside of work?

I do a lot of digital photography and I'm a big science fiction reader – I've actually written two unpublished novels. I love walking, and my wife and I consider ourselves to be 'perpetual tourists': we always enjoy visiting all of the historical and artistic sites wherever we live.
