

British Newspapers 1600-1950 provides the most comprehensive range of national, regional and local newspapers printed in Britain between the 17th and early 20th centuries that has ever been made available in a digital programme. The collections within the *British Newspapers 1600-1950* series provide a rich range of publications to reflect the social, political and cultural events of the times in which they were published. Sourced from the vast newspaper holdings of the British Library, the selected publications provide in-depth coverage of historic events, cultural icons, sporting events, the arts and culture. The series comprises the following collections:

17th and 18th Century Burney Collection

Gathered by Reverend Charles Burney (1757-1817), this represents the largest single collection of 17th and 18th century English news media available from the British Library and includes more than 1,000 pamphlets, proclamations, newsbooks and newspapers from the period. This collection helps researchers chart the development of the newspaper as we now know it, beginning with irregularly published transcriptions of Parliamentary debates and proclamations to coffee house newsbooks, finally arriving at newspaper in the form we are familiar with today.

19th Century British Library Newspapers Part I

Covering 46 newspapers (and 2 million pages) Part I contains a vast range of national, regional, and local newspapers. As with Part II and III, the papers have been carefully selected by an editorial board from the British Library to provide users with a broad yet detailed view of British life; from business and sport, to politics, entertainment and the arts. Part I consists of daily and weekly publications and reflects Britain's growing role as a superpower in the 19th century world.

19th Century British Library Newspapers Part II

Part II brings an additional 22 newspaper titles further expanding the range of English regional newspapers and the political views represented in the programme. Researchers can find the newspapers of a number of significant towns and regions included in this collection: Nottingham, Bradford, Leicester, Sheffield, and York as well as North Wales. The addition of two major London newspapers, *The Standard* and the *Morning Post*, help capture conservative opinion in the 19th century, balancing the progressive, more liberal views of the newspapers that appear in Part I. Adding papers that encompass a wider variety of political views enables researchers to further explore issues from a number of contrasting perspectives.

British Newspapers Part III: 1780-1950

Part III adds even more regional and local papers from the late eighteenth century to the mid-20th century. With nearly 1.2 million pages and more than 30 newspapers, this collection contains such noteworthy publications as:

Portsmouth Evening News Newcastle Journal Nottingham Evening Post Birmingham Gazette Leeds Intelligencer Newcastle Guardian and Tyne Mercury

The key benefits for researchers in Part III are discovering the kind of local information only ever published in local newspapers; comparing different reports of a particular event from a range of local newspapers; and examining how dispatches from London were interpreted and transmitted differently depending upon the opinions held by a region or town.

British Newspapers Part IV

Similar to Part III, this selection of titles extends back into the late 18th century and reaches into the mid-20th century. The collection includes 24 newspapers (over 1 million pages) with key titles being the *Evening Telegraph* (Dundee), *Illustrated Times, Manchester Mercury, Edinburgh Evening News, Nottingham Evening Post* and *Yorkshire Gazette*.
